# ANNOUNCEMENTS

**The Mystery of Lent**—We may be sure that a season so sacred as this of Lent is rich in mysteries. The Church has made it a time of recollection and penance, in preparation for the greatest of all her feasts; she would, therefore, bring into it everything that could excite the faith of her children, and encourage them to go through the arduous work of atonement for their sins

During Septuagesima, we had the number seventy, which reminds us of those seventy years of captivity in Babylon, after which God's chosen people, being purified from idolatry, was to return to Jerusalem and celebrate the Pasch.

It is the number forty that the Church now brings before us: a number, as St. Jerome observes, which denotes punishment and affliction.

Let us remember the forty days and forty nights of the deluge sent by God in His anger, when He repented that He had made man, and destroyed the whole human race with the exception of one family. Let us consider how the Hebrew people, in punishment for their ingratitude, wandered forty years in the desert, before they were permitted to enter the promised land. Let us listen to our God commanding the Prophet Ezechiel to lie forty days on his right side, as a figure of the siege which was to bring destruction on Jerusalem.


There are two persons in the old Testament who represent the two manifestations of God: Moses, who typifies the Law; and Elias, who is the figure of the Prophets. Both of these are permitted to approach God: the first on Sinai, the second on Horeb; but both of them have to prepare for the great favour by an expiatory fast of forty days.

With these mysterious facts before us, we can understand why it is that the Son of God, having become Man for our salvation and wishing to subject Himself to the pain of fasting, chose the number of forty days.

The institution of Lent is thus brought before us with everything that can impress the mind with its solemn character, and with its power of appeasing God and purifying our souls.

Let us, therefore, look beyond the little world which surrounds us, and see how the whole Christian universe is, at this very time, offering this forty days' penance as a sacrifice of propitiation to the offended Majesty of God; and let us hope that, as in the case of the Ninivites, He will mercifully accept this year's offering of our atonement, and pardon us our sins.

**FROM YOUR PASTOR**—It has been quite sad over the last few weeks to hear from so many in the parish suffering in many different ways. *If one member suffers any thing, all the members suffer with it.* Indeed, as sad as the many trials are that we face, it is wonderful that we can hold each other close in prayer, and we can do this even when there is nothing we can do to ease someone's illness, financial struggle, or marital problem.

We as a parish should take steps more formally to help each other, however, in prayer. Therefore, I would like to unite the many prayer requests that come in—especially those submitted to the prayer chain that Fr. Cortes manages—with a specific Mass intention each month as part of the St. Jude devotion, which we keep on third Wednesdays monthly.

The intention of this Mass going forward then (starting in March), will be for the intentions shared in the weekly prayer chain email message. Specifically, the Mass intention will be for those requests published since the prior St. Jude devotion. I hope this will inspire more people to pray even more fervently for fellow parishioners, who suffer in hundreds of different ways.

You may associate yourself with these prayers in an additional way by requesting Mass intentions such as: "for the prayer chain requests published since the prior St. Jude devotion." Such an intention would be applied at the Mass of the St. Jude devotion, and if we receive many, we can put them in the queue as any other Mass intentions.

# Guidelines for fasting during Lent—Laws according to *The Discipline of 1962*

Laws of Days of Abstinence—1962: Applies at age 7 Complete abstinence: all Fri1days of the year, Ash Wednesday, Holy Saturday, and the Vigil of Christmas Current Practice: Applies at age 14—Ash Wednesday and the Fridays of Lent, and obliges abstention from flesh meat

Laws of Days of Abstinence—1962: Partial abstinence: all the days of Lent, the Ember days of Wednesday and Saturday, and the Vigils of Pentecost and the Assumption (meat and soup, or gravy made from meat permitted once per day at the principal meal)

Current Practice: Not applicable

Laws of Days of Abstinence—1962: Abstinence from meat is dispensed on Holy Days of Obligation Current Practice: Dispensed on Solemnities

Laws of Fast—1962: Applies for ages 21 to 59, inclusive Days of Lent from Ash Wednesday inclusive of Ember Days, and Vigils of Christmas, Pentecost, and the Assumption Current Practice: Age 18 to 59—Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, but also on specified days of penance during Lent

Laws of Fast—1962: One full meal permitted, and two other meals may be taken which, when combined, are less than a full meal

Current Practice: Same
