PROPERS OF THE MASS

Lesson Gal 4:22-31

Brethren: It is written that Abraham had two sons, the one by a slave -girl and the other by a free woman. And the son of the slave-girl was born according to the flesh, but the son of the free woman in virtue of the promise. This said by way of allegory. For these are the two covenants: one indeed from Mount Sinai bringing forth children unto bondage, which is Agar. For Sinai is a mountain in Arabia, which corresponds to the present Jerusalem, and is in slavery with her children. But that Jerusalem which is above is free, which is our mother. For it is written, Rejoice, O barren one, that do not bear; break forth and cry, you that do not travail; for many are the children of the desolate, more than of her that has a husband. Now we, brethren, are the children of the promise, as Isaac was. But as then he who then took the loaves, and when He had given thanks, distributed was born according to the flesh, persecuted him who was born according to the spirit, so also it is now. But what does the Scripture say? Cast out the slave-girl and her son, for the son of the slave-girl shall not be heir with the son of the free woman. Therefore, brethren, we are not children of a slave-girl, but of the free woman - in virtue of the freedom wherewith Christ has made us free.

sick. Jesus therefore went up the mountain, and sat there with His disciples. Now the Passover, the feast of the Jews, was near. When, therefore, Jesus had lifted up His eyes and seen that a very great crowd had come to Him, He said to Philip, Whence shall we buy bread that these may eat? But He said this to try him, for He Himself knew what He would do. Philip answered Him, Two hundred denarii worth of bread is not enough for them, that each one may receive a little. One of His disciples, Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter, said to Him. There is a young boy here who has five barley loaves and two fishes; but what are these among so many? Jesus then said, Make the people recline. Now there was much grass in the place. The men therefore reclined, in number about five thousand. Jesus them to those reclining; and likewise the fishes, as much as they wished. But when they were filled, He said to His disciples, Gather the fragments that are left over, lest they be wasted. They therefore gathered them up; and they filled twelve baskets with the fragments of the five barley loaves left over by those who had eaten. When the people, therefore, had seen the sign which Jesus had worked, they said, This is indeed the Prophet Who is to come into the world. So when Jesus perceived that they would come to take Him by force and make Him king He fled again to the mountain, Himself alone.


Mar. 25: Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary in Lent This is a great day, not only to man, but even to God Himself; for it is the anniversary of the most solemn event that time has ever witnessed. On this day, the divine Word, by whom the Father created the world, was made flesh in the womb of a virgin, and dwelt among us. We must spend it in joy. Whilst we adore the Son of God who humbled Himself by thus becoming Man, let us give thanks to the Father, who so loved the world, as to give His only-begotten Son; let us give thanks to the Holy Ghost, whose almighty power achieves the great mystery. We are in the very midst of Lent, and yet the ineffable joys of Christmas are upon us: our Emmanuel is conceived on this day, and, nine months hence, will be born in Bethlehem, and the angels will invite us to come and honour the sweet Babe.

Mary has heard the angel's explanation of the mystery; the will of heaven is made known to her, and how grand an honour it is to bring upon her! She, the humble maid of Nazareth, is to have the ineffable happiness of becoming the Mother of God, and yet the treasure of her virginity is to be left to her! Mary bows down before this sovereign will, and says to the heavenly messenger: 'Behold the handmaid of the Lord: be it done to me according to thy word. This sublime mystery puts between the eternal Word and a mere woman the relations of Son and Mother; it gives to the almighty God a means whereby He may, in a manner worthy of His majesty, triumph over satan, who hitherto seemed to have prevailed against the divine plan.

Mar. 26: Passion Sunday—After having proposed the fortydays' fast of Jesus in the desert to the meditation of the faithful during the first four weeks of Lent, the holy Church gives the two weeks which still remain before Easter to the commemoration of the Passion. She would not have her children come to that great day of the immolation of the Lamb, without having prepared for it by compassionating with Him in the sufferings He endured in their stead. The Fifth Sunday of Lent marks the beginning of Passiontide. Inspired by the Gospel for the Fifth Sunday of Lent, the Church veils sacred images in the sanctuary and chapel the evening before Passion Sunday.

We read, "Jesus hid himself and went out of the temple." (John 8:59). In an effort to unite all of our senses to this mystery, where Christ hid himself from those who would stone Him when it was not yet His time, we "hide" our sacred images and statues with purple cloth. The statues remain covered until the Gloria at the Easter Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday, and the unveiling signifies Christ's revealing His Risen nature and victory to all. Please note that for practical reasons, we will not be veiling the large Crucifix hanging in the sanctuary.



Seminary Burse Collection—We thank parishioners who donated \$2,721 during the last quarter of 2022 and which we sent to Our Lady of Guadalupe Seminary in Denton, Nebraska, to support fellow parishioner Andrew Sloane, a first-year seminarian. We received a note of thanks from Andrew in which he expressed his gratitude:

Mar. 20: Traditional St. Joseph Table—This popular devotion in honor of St. Joseph will be arranged in the reception hall of the parish center. Please visit after the 6:30pm High Mass tomorrow (the feast is moved by one day because if falls on a Sunday). The tradition of the "St. Joseph Table" (*"la tavala di San Giuseppe"*) has its origin in Sicily. Legends from the Middle Ages attributed the end of a devastating drought to a prayer-devotion that the Sicilian people made to St. Joseph. This celebration is a symbolic "thank you" and renewal of the Sicilian people's devotion to Saint Joseph. To participate, please drop off your bread inside the wooden doors of 112 State St. before the 6:30pm High Mass.

New Votive Candles for St. Joseph—Additionally, in honor of St. Joseph, we will be making candles available today, to be burned before his altar as votive offerings. These specific candles will normally be stubs from the candles burned on the high altar for Mass. Rather than waste these candles by recycling them with several inches remaining, and rather than burning them all the way down at the altar for Mass (that can get messy), we provide these stubs for you to offer for your own private intentions. We invite you to make a donation to cover the cost of these candles, and to burn them beside the altar of St. Joseph. For your information, for the past several months, we have been burning candles on the altars that are made of 100 percent beeswax (previously we burned 51 percent beeswax), which is a precious substance required for the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, and deep in its religious symbolism. Once these beeswax stubs have burned all of the way down, we will then take the small bit that remains, collect them, then send them back to be recycled into new candles. In this way, we will try to avoid wasting any of this wonderful substance made by the bees.
