PROPERS OF THE MASS

Lesson Rom 8:18-23

Brethren: I reckon that the sufferings of the present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory to come that will be revealed in us. For the eager longing of creation awaits the revelation of the sons of God. For creation was made subject to vanity - not by its own will but by reason of Him Who made it subject - in hope, because creation itself also will be delivered from its slavery to corruption into the freedom of the glory of the sons of God. For we know that all creation groans and travails in pain until now. And not only it, but we ourselves also who have the first-fruits of the Spirit - we ourselves groan within ourselves, waiting for the adoption as sons of God, the redemption of our body, in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Gospel Luke 5:1-11

At that time, while the crowds were pressing upon Jesus to hear the word of God, He was standing by Lake Genesareth. And He saw two boats moored by the lake, but the fishermen had left them and were washing their nets. And getting into one of the boats, the one that was Simon's, He asked him to put out a little from the land. And sitting down, He began to teach the crowds from the boat. But when He had ceased speaking, He said to Simon, Put out into the deep, and lower your nets for a catch. And Simon answered and said to Him, Master, the whole night through we have toiled and have taken nothing; but at Your word I will lower the net. And when they had done so, they enclosed a great number of fishes, but their net was breaking. And they beckoned to their comrades in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both the boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw this, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord. For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish they had made; and so were also James and John, the sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. And Jesus said to Simon, Do not be afraid; henceforth you shall catch men. And when they had brought their boats to land, they left all and followed Him.

Completion of Construction of the Library—Throughout the Scriptures, many references are made to the importance of wisdom. Indeed, Christ himself is referred to as the "Wisdom of God," (1 Cor. 1:24). St. Thomas Aquinas says that this is a correct way to refer to the second person of the Blessed Trinity: "Therefore, the Word of God is rightly called conceived or begotten wisdom, as being the wise conception of the divine mind" (*Summa contra Gentiles*, IV, 12).

Christ himself has revealed to us the hidden nature of God, and this revelation has been manifested to us over 20 centuries by many wise men whose wisdom and writings have been recognized by the Church. Since the Church does indeed possess *Begotten Wisdom* itself, it is very important for us as Catholics to learn from these teachers so that we come closer to knowing our great God.


In the Old Testament, the people were warned that if they failed to seek God, they would be deprived of teaching: "If you seek him, you shall find: but if you forsake him, he will forsake you. And many days shall pass in Israel, without the true God, and without a priest a teacher, and without the law." (2 Chron. 15:2-3). In the new covenant, we have not been left orphan but have been blessed with so much wisdom.

Recognizing this, it is important for a parish to have a place where wisdom can be acquired through reading the great doctors and teachers of the Church, as well as the Church's magisterial documents. Our parish library in the basement of the church has been blessed with these resources thanks to the sacrifices of our parishioners in the past, but it is also important to house such wisdom in place that is beautiful, such that its beauty reflects something of the wisdom that it contains, and shows those interested in the Catholic Faith that our religion is serious, and truly wise.

Thanks to the generosity of our many benefactors, and the skilled carpentry of Fred Shibler and Co., room 216 in the parish center (112 State Street) has been marvelously transformed into a beautiful library. Most of our books have not been installed in the library yet, but this will happen over the next several weeks. We also plan to announce a system for borrowing books from the library, and a way to access the non-circulating volumes, which include our treasures: St. Thomas, St. Augustine, and our Fathers of the Church series.

May God reward those who have worked so hard on this project, and been so generous for it!

Welcome to His Excellency, Timothy C. Senior—With the acceptance of the retirement of Bishop Ronald Gainer by Pope Francis in April, the Holy See has appointed Bishop Senior as the new Bishop of Harrisburg, effective this past Wednesday, June 21, when he was installed in a ceremony at the Cathedral of St. Patrick, just down the street. We are very grateful for the tender pastoral care that Bp. Gainer has shown us these past years, and we look forward to cooperating with Bp. Senior, and to being guided by him as we seek to obtain heaven.

From Bishop's biography, posted on the diocesan website: "Bishop Senior was ordained an Auxiliary Bishop of Philadelphia in July, 2009. He was the Regional Bishop of Montgomery County and Philadelphia-South, as well as Chancellor of Saint Charles Borromeo Seminary, in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. Prior to these responsibilities with the Archdiocese, Bishop Senior served as Rector of Saint Charles Borromeo Seminary from 2012 to 2022, after having been the Moderator of the Curia of the Archdiocese from 2009 to 2012....A 1977 graduate of Lansdale Catholic High School, Lansdale, Pa., Bishop Senior is a classically trained pianist and the youngest of the three children of the late James H. and Elise Rothwell Senior. He was ordained a priest of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia in 1985."

Similarly, the Communion is taken from Psalm 17:3 which proclaims, "O Lord, my rock, my fortress, my deliverer: my God, my rock of refuge!" Orlandus Lassus sets this same verse in the motet Factus est Dominus. This work, as Discite a Me sung last week, is structured in three distinct sections.

Orlandus Lassus (c.1532–1594) is known for the mature polyphonic style in the Franco-Flemish school. He wrote over 2,000 works in Latin, French, Italian, and German both sacred and secular. Lassus along with Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina and Tomás Luis de Victoria are the most influential composers of the late Renaissance.
