PROPER S OF THE MASS

Lesson Rom 6:3-11

Brethren: All we who have been baptized into Christ Jesus have been baptized into His death. For we were buried with Him by means of Baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ has arisen from the dead through the glory of the Father, so we also may walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with Him in the likeness of His death, we shall be so in the likeness of His resurrection also. For we know that our old self has been crucified with Him, in order that the body of sin may be destroyed, that we may no longer be slaves to sin; for he who is dead is acquitted of sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live together with Christ; for we know that Christ, having risen from the dead, dies now no more, death shall no longer have dominion over Him. For the death that He died, He died to sin once for all, but the life that He lives, He lives unto God. Thus do you consider yourselves also as dead to sin, but alive to God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Gospel Mark 8:1-9

At that time, when there was a great crowd with Jesus, and they had nothing to eat, He called His disciples together and said to them, I have compassion on the crowd, for behold, they have now been with Me three days, and have nothing to eat; and if I send them away to their homes fasting, they will faint on the way, for some of them have come from a distance. And His disciples answered Him, How will anyone be able to satisfy these with bread, here in a desert? And He asked them, How many loaves have you? And they said, Seven. And He bade the crowd recline on the ground. Then taking the seven loaves, He gave thanks, broke them and gave them to His disciples to distribute; and they set them before the crowd. And they had a few little fishes; and He blessed them, and ordered them to be distributed. And they ate and were satisfied; and they took up what was left of the fragments, seven baskets. Now those who had eaten were about four thousand. And He dismissed them.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

NEXT SUNDAY: July 16, Enrollment in the Brown Scapular—For Catholics who have never been enrolled in the Brown Scapular, we encourage you to do so next Sunday, on the feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, which commemorates the event when Our Lady gave the Brown Scapular to St. Simon Stock. Since July 16 falls on a Sunday this year, we do not celebrate it liturgically, but it is the perfect time to have yourself enrolled as well as your children (those who've received First Holy Communion and older). To maintain this devotion, it is required that one prays the Little Office of the Blessed Virgin Mary daily, or, by permission of one's pastor, daily recitation of five decades of the Holy Rosary fulfills this obligation.

We will perform the enrollment ceremony after each Mass at the Communion rail. Simply kneel at the Communion rail after Mass, and bring your own scapular. If you do not have one, we may have some at the office we could provide, but please call in advance to confirm there are some left. You can probably acquire a Brown Scapular at any religious goods store.



From Dom Gueranger's *The Liturgical Year*:

“In the night between the 15th and 16th of July of the year 1251, the gracious Queen of Carmel confirmed to her sons by a mysterious sign the right of citizenship she had obtained for them in their newly adopted countries; as mistress and mother of the entire religious state she conferred upon them with her queenly hands the scapular, hitherto the distinctive garb of the greatest and most ancient religious family of the West. On giving St. Simon Stock this badge, ennobled by contact with her sacred fingers, the Mother of God said to him: ‘Whosoever shall die in this habit shall not suffer eternal flames.’ But not against hell fire alone was the all-powerful intercession of the Blessed Mother to be felt by those who should wear her scapular. In 1316, when every holy soul was imploring heaven to put a period to that long and disastrous widowhood of the Church which followed on the death of Clement V, the Queen of Saints appeared to James d’Euse, whom the world was soon to hail as John XXII; she foretold to him his approaching elevation to the Sovereign Pontificate, and at the same time recommended him to publish the privilege she had obtained from her Divine Son for her children of Carmel—viz., a speedy deliverance from purgatory. ‘I, their Mother, will graciously go down to them on the Saturday after their death, and all whom I find in purgatory I will deliver and will bring to the mountain of life eternal.’ These are the words of our Lady herself, quoted by John XXII in the Bull which he published for the purpose of making known the privilege, and which was called the Sabbatine Bull on account of the day chosen by the glorious benefactress for the exercise of her mercy.”

THIS WEEK: Annual Chant Camp (Monday-Friday)—Nearly 50 children have enrolled in this year's chant camp, and they are looking forward to a wonderful week of music, fun, and sports. We are especially grateful to Joelle Riethmiller, who is working with Paul Thomas May, our music director, and Deacon Jacob Kasak and seminarian Andrew Daniels, both of whom flew out from the seminary to help with this annual event.

Since the children will be in training to help with the liturgy, we believe it is beneficial for them to have more options to assist at Mass, so each day will begin with Mass. Please note the following additions and adjustments to our normal weekly schedule in order to accommodate chant camp.

SPECIAL SCHEDULE THIS WEEK

Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday: Masses at both 7:10am (as normal) and additionally at 8:10am (following the hour of Terce). Exposition will be delayed to accommodate the 8:10am Mass.

Wednesday: Mass at 6:15am, Terce at 8am, followed by the Rosary, led by Deacon Kasak, with the second Mass as usual in the evening at 6:30pm.

Friday: Masses as normal at 7:10am and 6:30pm, but with an additional High Mass at 11am in which the children will apply what they have learned all week by singing at the Mass itself.



Notes on Today's Music

Processional hymn: *My God, Accept My Heart This Day*, 942
Recessional hymn: *Lord, Enthroned in Heav'nly Splendor*, 939

Offertory Antiphon: *Perfice gressus*, Orlandus Lassus (c.1532–1594)

Motet at communion: *Caro mea*, Andrea Gabrieli (c. 1532–1585)

Both choral selections this week are from contemporaneous Renaissance composers. *Perfice gressus* by Orlandus Lassus is a four-voice setting of this week's Offertory antiphon. Set in a major key, the composition has a bright and hopeful character. This is emphasized as Lassus focuses musically on the last line of text, "Thou save those who trust in Thee, O Lord."

Caro Mea by **Andrea Gabrieli (c.1532–1585)** is a setting of John 6:56–57 composed for the feast of Corpus Christi. Gabrieli's motet is an excellent example of a Renaissance motet containing short a motive that is repeated by all voices in their respective ranges, imitative lines throughout and reaching the climax about two thirds through the work and ending with a final major chord, though the work was in minor throughout.

Andrea Gabrieli (c. 1532–1585) was an Italian composer and organist of the late Renaissance. The uncle of the somewhat more famous Giovanni Gabrieli and contemporary of Orlandus Lassus. From 1566 until his death he held the post as organist at St. Mark's in Venice, which was one of the most prominent music positions in Italy. His works include over a hundred motets and madrigals, as well as a smaller number of instrumental works.
